Attainment Report Pre-Prep 2020-21

This year has proved to be another very happy and successful year for children in Pre-Prep.

We continue, each day, to welcome happy children who love school and who strive to be good friends, good learners and good citizens. This year above all others they have demonstrated a resilience and application we are so proud of and made hugely encouraging pastoral and academic progress. We believe that these starting points enable children to be the best they can be across and beyond the curriculum now and in the future.

- · In Reception 88% of Crescent children attained a 'good level of development'. The national average is 72%. This data is based upon the children achieving the expected level of development across 12 key Early Learning Goals (they include Communication and Language; Physical Development; Personal Social Emotional; Literacy and Maths). The average national point score is 34.6, at Crescent it is 41.
- · In Year 1 90% of children met or exceeded expectations in Reading, in Writing and in Maths.
- · Year 2 children have also continued to thrive. In Reading 90%, Writing 85% and Maths 100% of children met or exceeded national expectations.

In terms of exceeding age expectations:

- · 17% of Reception children exceeded expectations across all 17 Early Learning Goals. 58% exceeded expectations in Reading, 50% in Writing and 58% in Maths (a real achievement for these children in a very difficult year).
- · In Year 1 in Reading and Writing 35% of children exceeded national expectations while in Maths it was 40%
- In Year 2 35% of children exceeded age expectations in Reading and Maths and 25% in Writing. We are very proud of the huge amount of work that children, parents and staff put into achieving this super progress.

Crescent pupils on track despite the lockdowns

ndependent assessments confirmed that Crescent pupils stayed on track in 2021 either meeting or exceeding expectations in the core subjects of English, Maths and Science. A result that really pleased the school's Head of Curriculum, Deputy Head, Bryony Forth.

Ms Forth, explains, "When you heard on the news of children needing to 'catch up' after the disruption of the lockdowns, as a teacher it made your heart sink. Right from the very start of the pandemic, the Crescent was determined to continue providing a high standard of teaching and learning and the pupils were able to access their lessons through the learning platform, Seesaw. Over the past year our teachers worked really hard to engage our pupils through stimulating home learning tasks and live lessons. Throughout this challenging period teachers and pupils were hugely supported by our fantastic parents."

Post the lockdowns, pupils from Year 1 to Year 6 took GL Assessments and achieved great results. The independent formative assessments happen every year for the core subjects of English, Mathematics and Science (for Year 3 to Year 6) and for 2021 the overwhelming majority of pupils scored at either the 'expected' standard for their year group, or 'exceeded' expectations.





In Maths 100% of Year 1 to Year 6 pupils met or exceeded expectations.



In English 99.3% of Year 1 to Year 6 pupils met or exceeded



In Science 100% of Year 3 to Year 6 pupils met or exceeded expectations.

Ms Forth, continued, "We were thrilled with the pupils' achievements as they were. It's a resounding endorsement of the school's approach. The scores demonstrate just how well the classes performed through the disruption of two lockdowns and the resilience the children showed towards learning despite all the changes they experienced."

Marvellous Maths

Maths is about investigating and exploring and building strong foundations, and Reception children have had the opportunity to do this in a hands-on, practical way. From sharing a picnic to understand division, to making a pizza to explore halves, creating spooky potions at Halloween to explore capacity and using our shoes, fingers and toes to count in multiples. We have blasted off in rockets counting backwards to zero, learned how to recognise and add coins to buy food in our shop, hunted around school to identify 2D shapes and built our own imaginary worlds with 3D shapes to explore their properties. We have discussed ratio by baking bread like the Little Red Hen and learnt to tell the time enjoying the game What's The Time Mr Wolf. Huge fun and huge progress!

roman Shields

During their topic on The Romans, Year 3 designed their own shields, fit for a Roman soldier. They included some traditional pictures, such as lightning bolts, wreaths and eagles, alongside more personal symbols, such as suns, moons, flowers and animals. They used striking colours and created imaginative designs.

Although totally disallowed at the beginning of the year, Year 3 enjoyed booking virtual holidays the old-fashioned way with brochures, something quite a few of the pupils had not seen before! During the lockdown they used the wonders of technology to learn about their world topic of Biomes. Then in the Trinity Term their environmental topic focused on the plights of endangered animals. They had a particularly heartfelt debate on deforestation to create farmland for poorer famers versus the lemurs losing their homes in Madagascar.



A key objective in Year 3 Maths is to be able to count up and down in tenths and recognise that tenths are derived from dividing by 10. What better way to learn this than by the manipulation of food! Much fun was had finding tasty tenths. The children used a range of treats to explore tenths. They were able to identify, order, add and find equivalents of them. Super Maths skills.





Due to the Covid restrictions we were unable to have our usual trips to the theatre for Christmas but that didn't stop our fun! An afternoon of toilet paper snow men, paper plate fishes and doughnut challenges got us all in the festive spirit!



French

Year 3 studied the Planets in French. They had great fun practising the French names for the planets in our Solar system on the playground. They used their listening skills to run to the correct planet cards as it was called out and then named the next planet in turn as the ball was passed to them. The children then made models, posters and other jigsaws about the Solar System while speaking in full sentences in French. Children learn better when they are moving and associating actions with words.

Super Sunglasses

The children enjoyed learning about light in their Science lessons. They found out that the sun is bad for their eyes and that they need protection. In class they carried out experiments to decide which material was most suitable for sunglasses. They then designed and made their own pair and tried them out on their way home in the sunshine.



Tiger Projects

Our English unit on traditional tales used the beautiful book, *Tiger Child* by Joanna Troughton This lively folk tale from Orissa, India, explained why tigers eat their food uncooked and why cats live with people. The tiger child is sent to fetch some more fire from the village, but on the way he gets distracted by his friends. By the time he gets to the village, he has forgotten what he has been sent to fetch. The children got creative using tigers as their theme and produced some beautiful work.

GEOGRAPHY

In the summer term Year 4 raised money for the Bwengu projects, choosing to fix school rooves and feed hungry orphans in Malawi.

Fantastic Fairy Tales

Year 4 considered what the traditional elements of a fairy tale are and studied three very different versions of *The Princess and the Pea*. The authors had 'innovated' the story in exciting ways, but the plot and characters were the same.

The children then looked at how to break the story down into its relevant stages, to lead the reader through the tale in creative ways. They each selected their favourite fairy tale and created a story map, using banners, speech bubbles, arrows, and colourful illustrations to bring their tale to life. The results were fantastic, and they went up on the wall in our classroom. Well done Year 4!





Soma Cube Challenge

In the Trinity Term the children studied measurement in Maths, and they attempted the 'Soma Cube' challenge. They created specified 3D shapes using 2D representations using connectable cubes and then combined these to create other 3D shapes.

In History we enjoy exploring the past. In Year 6 we travel to Ancient Greece, investigate local history in Victorian times and question why the Mayan Empire died out.






BRILLIANT HOMEMADE BRIDGES



Across the school 31 children have read over 1 million words this year, 10 are multimillionaires and one, Drew, has read 6 million words, that is 193 books this year.


Our lovely class libraries have allowed the children plenty of choice of material, we have class readers for all classes through the year and our English lessons are always based around books.




Year 3 enjoyed experiencing different authors and illustrators as part of their World Book Day celebrations. The children were inspired to produce a wide range of illustrations in their work.

Crescent School to benefit from enhanced facilities

In May the school was excited to announce that planning permission had been granted for the school to transform a building at the heart of its campus.

Work on the 250m² building, which was previously leased to Pathfinders Nursery, started at the end of that month to ensure it would be completed for the start of the 2021-2022 academic year.

The building, will be known as the Horton Centre, reflecting the school's origins on Rugby's Horton Crescent.

Joe Thackway, Headmaster, explains, "Our vision for the Crescent is for it to be a small but perfect preparatory school. Part of our development strategy over the last few years has been to upgrade and update our facilities. This has been constrained by our site and the desire to maintain the outdoor space we have for sport and recreation."

"We now find ourselves in the unique position of being able to significantly enhance our facilities for the benefit of the whole school community. The Horton Centre will house a classroom for our Year 2 children, a flexible space for the Performing Arts and our Before and After School wrap around care will benefit from a new home."

The approved plans include two new sets of double doors straight out on to the playground which will especially benefit children attending After School providing them with the opportunity for outside play. The new Year 2 classroom will also have its own dedicated outside space, while Years 3 and 4 will gain a dedicated break out space. The finish will be similar to the recent refurbishment of the library and the top of the Green Mile.

Once it started, work progressed rapidly and the children were excited, keeping an eye on all the changes through the windows in the corridors!
