This school year, Head of Pastoral and Pre Prep, Mr Webb, worked with the School Council, pupils and staff to refresh the Crescent School Promise.

In the Michaelmas Term pupils took part in activities to engage with the 12 commitments and on the basis of those activities the School Promise was reviewed. The updated promise was presented to the school community in assembly with supporting materials shared in the classrooms across school. The School Promise card was also been updated and to help bring the commitments to life we unveiled exciting new School Promise graphics on walls around the school. They are a great visual reminder and are sure to enhance the engagement with and ownership of the promise.



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Attainment Report Pre-Prep 2022-2023

This year proved to be another very happy and successful year for children in Pre-Prep.

Each day, we welcomed children who love school and who strive to be good friends, good learners and good citizens. This year, once again, they have demonstrated a resilience and application we are so proud of and made hugely encouraging pastoral and academic progress. We believe that these starting points enable children to be the best they can be across and beyond the curriculum well into their futures.

In Reception the average number of Early Learning Goals at the expected level of development per child was 15.5 compared to the 2022 national score of 14.1. The percentage of children at a 'good level of development' at Crescent was 75% compared to 65% nationally and the percentage of children at 'expected' levels across all 17 Early Learning Goals was also 75% compared to 63% nationally.

- In Year 1 93% of children met or exceeded expectations in Reading, Writing and in Maths.
- In Year 2 84% of children met or exceeded expectations in Reading, Writing and in Maths.

In terms of exceeding age expectations:

- In Year 1 39% of children exceeded national expectations in Reading, 32% in Writing and 36% in Maths.
- In Year 2 58% of children exceeded age expectations in Reading, 33% in Writing and 43% in Maths in comparision with the national average of 11%.
- Children continue to thrive and we are very proud of the huge amount of work that children, parents and staff put into achieving these results.

18 of the 24-strong class went to Princethorpe College, while two children chose the local grammar school as their future destination. We are especially delighted that seven of our Year 6 pupils were awarded scholarships, including all-rounder, art and academic awards.

Sarah Webb, Assistant Head and Year 6 Teacher, said, "Our aim is always to do our best to help our pupils reach the destination secondary school of their choice. Despite the challenges of recent years, the children have enjoyed great success. We are particularly pleased with the range of scholarship offers they have received. It's an excellent outcome and everyone here is really delighted for them."

These ranged from the very delicate to the most robust of structures. They planned and considered each part of their build, choosing appropriate materials and resources. There was teamwork and collaboration aplenty and the results were astonishing, including a tower to the sky, a rocket to the moon and a slippery snake! All truly remarkable constructions backed up by truly inspiring imaginations.





Forest School

Forest School was added to the Reception curriculum this year and what fun they had!

After learning three important rules: 'no pick, no lick', 'respect each other and respect off they went to explore.

They discovered all the amazing things that the outside has to offer. They made 'listening' men and buzzy bees using materials from the natural world. They honed their skills of balance, climbing and swinging. They learned to respect each other and work co-operatively, they made connections, investigated, and explored. They built their resilience and their ability to try new things and most of all, they discovered that mud is fun!







CELEBRATIONS

2023 was quite the year with the Coronation of a King and Crescent School reaching its milestone 75th year. In Reception the children worked hard to celebrate each in full.

January saw pupils enjoying the school's birthday festivities marking Crescent's landmark anniversary. They baked and iced biscuits, learned a little history of the school and sorted and arranged educational artifacts into a timeline.

Then came the Coronation of King Charles III and what a day that was! Children made crowns, learned about the Royal Family, played some very British games including guess the name of the teddy, decorating a cookie and welly wanging! They had a whole school picnic on the field and more than a little rain fell but then the sun came out for ice cream. This was a real community day and helped cement Reception's place in the school.



Christmas **Festivities**

As the first term rolled to a close, Reception took to the stage to tell the story of Baa Baa Bethlehem. They learned their lines and remembered their moves and were so proud to stand in front of the audience and give a knockout performance.

The Christmas festivities continued with a trip to the theatre to see 'Twas the Night Before Christmas. This was our first trip out as a class and the manners and behaviour on display were impeccable. World Book Day

World Book Day in March was an opportunity to ignite a love of reading and books in the classroom. The children dressed up as a myriad of characters and took pleasure in standing up to show off their costumes and explain the book they had chosen to portray.

This led nicely into our topic of Traditional Tales. We studied many stories: The Three Little Pigs, Goldilocks and the Three Bears, Jasper's Beanstalk and so many more. The children used alternatives of each story and discussed how they were different and then did cross-curricular follow up work, including writing, collage, and bean planting to enhance their learning and understanding.



Lifecycles

As the school year came to a close, pupils focused on lifecycles. There was great excitement when the caterpillars arrived by post! Reception spent a lot of time observing them as they grew and grew. They were amazed when they began spinning

their silk and turned into chrysalises. They made us laugh when they started 'wriggling' and then we were awe struck when they hatched into magnificent butterflies. Reception waited for a sunny day and finally released them into the wild.

The children also studied the life cycles of frogs and humans, but the butterflies were by far their favourites. To celebrate their release, the class visited the Butterfly Farm in Stratford and were captivated by the beauty and diversity of the natural world.

SHALOME SHABBAT

In RE in the Michaelmas Term, Year 2E were introduced to some of the key symbols of the Jewish faith. They investigated Shabbat, the day of rest, and discussed



some of the key aspects of a Shabbat meal. They learned about challah bread and then had a go at making their own. Lots of fun was had mixing and kneading the dough to create little rolls.

BLOWING THE SHOFAR

The children went on to learn about the role of the Shofar in Judaism. The shofar is a horn that is blown to signify the start of Jewish New Year (Rosh Hashanah) and the end of Yom Kippur (the Sacred Day of Forgiveness). The children thought about forgiveness and learned how to say sorry in Hebrew, 'slicha'. They then enjoyed making and blowing their own shofar.



Cardboard Chairs

Year 2 designed chairs for their own toys. The children used different techniques with cardboard to create strong and stable structures.

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Beebot Maths

In preparation for their topic on clocks and telling the time, pupils secured and advanced their understanding of positional language, looking at left, right, clockwise, anti-clockwise, quarter, half and full turn. They worked in small groups to programme a Beebot to carry out instructions. Lots of fun and some great



Money Combinations

In their learning on money, pupils used an Olympic medal analogy to understand the value of gold, silver and bronze coins relative to each other. They secured their coin and note recognition and learnt two strategies for adding coins (counting on and applying 2-digit addition methods). Then they enjoyed seeing how many different coin combinations could be found for a set amount of money. It was fascinating to



Pizza Perfection

Pupils created healthy pizza bases and toppings as they learnt about nutrition and different cooking techniques. Everyone enjoyed choosing and using toppings from the different food types.

BOSSY BAKING

Year 2E enjoyed an English learning task that involved both baking and being bossy, which is quite a fun combination when you are six or seven. They looked at recipes and learnt how to put ingredients into a list using commas. They then had to write a method using imperative (bossy) verbs — put, mix, bake, stir etc. Then practised writing out a recipe focusing on being clear, concise and easy to follow. No waffle was allowed! The eating of the resulting cookies was lots of fun too!





Titanic Theatre

Year 2 had an exciting visit from Freshwater Theatre to enhance their history learning about the Titanic. They entered the hall in the dark after the iceberg had already been hit, rushing to get a space on one of only six lifeboats. They recreated the noise, the panic, the emotions of the disaster and further built their knowledge of the key facts. A life size timeline of events was created and the children role played the different experiences that people in 1st, 2nd and 3rd class would have had.



MOVING VEHICLES

In Design & Technology, Year 2E designed and created moving vehicles. Over the course of a few weeks' pupils constructed the chassis, axles and wheels to their own unique designs. They took their vehicles out on the playground to test out their designs. They lined up and each gave them one strong push and off they flew. Feranmi's fantastic design flew the furthest, but they were all fabulous — a great effort from Year 2.



Year 2E learnt about different landscape artists and how they used shape, colour, and texture in their artwork. The children then drew and painted pictures inspired by the seaside, and worked together to create colourful seascape collages.




Year 3 explored ways to improve the environment in which they live. They worked in groups to first design and then create clay sculptures for a chosen location within the school grounds.


Chime Bar Challenge

Pupils created their own unique pair of children's sunglasses. They learnt cutting and joining techniques in developing and constructing their own creative designs.




To kick start their Ancient Egyptians History topic the class took part in an online history session with Birmingham Museum and Art Gallery. The children virtually visited the Egyptian gallery, learning about Egyptian life and the afterlife, through looking at artefacts and completing history detective activities. Everyone found the mummies particularly interesting, especially the x-rays and scans which showed how the person might have died. It was an amazing session and really inspired their study of Ancient Egypt. The children even learned how to write their own names in hieroglyphics.

Calligrams

In English Year 3 studied different types of shape poems. A particular favourite was calligrams, where the word is written to reflect its meaning. Here are some of the children's great designs that supported their planning and then their finished poetry.





In their Maths lessons, the children investigated and explored the properties of 3D shapes. Year 3 learned the terms faces, vertex/vertices and edges. When counting them, pupils quickly realised that they had to employ a methodical and careful

Map Reading

Year 4 Geographers combined their map reading skills with historical evidence analysis. 
EVAPORATION




Spanish Projects

them through to the Plate competition.





Connect Bingo


Pupils played Connect Bingo in Mental Health Week. They enjoyed talking to each other, discovering how they could connect and completing their bingo cards.

Accelerated Reader

Crescent's approach to reading and literacy is supported by Renaissance's Accelerated Reader system. Assistant Head, Sarah Webb, explains, "Children in Years 3 to 6 take a quiz after reading each book that tests their understanding.



The approach promotes reading for pleasure whilst ensuring the children read appropriately

challenging books. It totals up the books and words read, and we find the competitive element has a positive impact on children's motivation to read."

Pupils can quiz daily on the computers before school. We like to get parents involved too and offer regular weeks where parents can join their children in quizzing on their reading books.

Over the year:

Years 4 and 3 read over 12,000 words.

Year 5 read over 15,000 words. Year 6 read over 14,000 words.

Our top word reader was Year 6 Tegan, who read over 3 million words while reading over 2 million each were: Arla, Lllah, Alex T and Zahra.

Year 3 read the most books, having passed 978 quizzes, while Year 4 read 487 books, Year 5 read 374 books and Year 6 read 283 books.

It was another fabulous year of reading by all.

Taekwondo

In Taekwondo Club the children worked towards their grades learning different skills including the breaking skill, a taekwondo technique that involves practitioners kicking a board with their feet. Focus Taekwondo offered two clubs this year, an afterschool session for Years 4 to 6 and an early morning Tiny Tigers session for Years R to 3.

Co-Curricular

The children enjoyed a wide range of co-curricular clubs across the school year. On offer were Mini-First Aid, Craft Club, Forest School, Didi Rugby, Taekwondo, Archery, Calligraphy and Chess to name but a few. 75th Anniversary


Crescent School, the Princethorpe Foundation's prep school in Bilton, Rugby, celebrated its 75th anniversary in 2023.
